**Fred Garretson, Ohio**

**Convention: Cincinnati, OH 1966**

**FRED T. GARRETSON (1920-2014)**

Fred T. Garretson was the first President of the National High School Athletic Coaches Association 1965-66. He was born in Handley, West Virginia, May 5, 1920. He attended Huntington HS where he was a Pole Vault State Champion. He joined the United States Army in 1940 and fought in the Battle of the Bulge for which he was awarded the Bronze Star. He married Virginia in 1942. They were married 63 years and had seven sons. He graduated from Miami University and taught bookkeeping and coached football, track, and swimming. Fred and Virginia loved to travel in their camper. They visited all 50 states and several foreign countries. Fred received the Dwight Keith Award in 1991. Fred passed away March 12, 2014.



**NHSACA 2<sup>nd</sup> President**

**Carey McDonald, Florida**

**Convention: Miami, FL 1967**

**CAREY E. McDONALD (1925- 2020)**

Carey McDonald was born in Waycross, Georgia on July 26, 1925. He attended Waresboro HS and graduated as salutatorian in 1942. He went to South Georgia Junior College where he lettered in basketball and was in the US Naval Reserve Program. After graduation he entered the US Navy which he left in 1946. He graduated from the University of Georgia in 1947 and went to work at Callahan HS in Florida. He was AD and Basketball Coach for 10 seasons. He also met Martha and they were married and had 2 children. Carey went to Ocala HS in 1957 and retired from coaching in 1964. His Wildcats won the Basketball State Championship in 1958. He continued at Ocala HS as assistant and then principal, retiring in 1972. During that time, he also served as NHSACA President 1966-67. He then took on the Florida Athletic Coaches Association as Executive Director. He added the job as Executive Director of the NHSACA in 1973. In 1977 he gave up the Florida Coaches Association and continued with the National till 1988. Under his leadership the NHSACA flourished. Carey was known for his excellent memory and organizational skills. He attended 57 straight Final Four Tournaments and over 25 Masters tournaments. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1984. Carey received the award named for him, The Carey E. McDonald Citation in 2015. Carey McDonald passed away July 29, 2020.





**NHSACA 3<sup>rd</sup> President**  
**Alvin Duke, Oklahoma**  
**Convention: Tulsa, OK 1968**

ALVIN C. DUKE (1923-1988)

Alvin C. Duke was born in Ladonis, TX, November 3, 1923. He graduated from Vinita HS and attended the University of Arkansas where he received his B.S. in 1941 and his Master in 1951. He played one year for the Chicago Bears and served in the Navy Air Corp during WW II. He was also in the CIA for 2 years. During his coaching career he won 12 conference championships, 10 district and 3 state championships at Enid HS in Oklahoma. He served as President of the State Coaches as well as the National High School Coaches Association 1967-68. He was married to Jean and they had three children. He passed away in 1988.



**NHSACA 4<sup>th</sup> President**  
**Bill Rockwell, California**  
**Convention: San Francisco, CA 1969**

WILLIAM S. ROCKWELL (1913-1970)

Bill (Rock) Rockwell was born February 19, 1913. He went to St. Mary's College where he set the schools' all-time basketball scoring record which stood for 11 years. He coached at Oakland's Fremont HS from 1942-55. From there he went to Oakland City College. He was well-known as a coach that taught the fundamentals. In 1957 he helped start the California Coaches Association. He served as Executive Secretary and kept it going. The Bill Rockwell Award is the highest award given by the California Coaches Association for service. He served as President of the NHSACA in 1968-69. He had retired from coaching and took over as athletic director at Merritt College in Oakland shortly before his death. He fell to his death down a 400 ft. cliff while backpacking with a friend on May 29, 1970.



**NHSACA 5<sup>th</sup> President**  
**Paul Smarks, Michigan**  
**Convention: Chicago, IL 1970**

PAUL SMARKS (1903-1976)

Paul Smarks was born in 1903. He coached 32 years at Lapeer HS. In 1949 he moved to Warren Fitzgerald HS. He was the founder of the Michigan High School Coaches Association in 1953. He donated \$50,000 to start the MHSCA Hall of Fame at Central Michigan University. He served as NHSACA President in 1969-70. Paul passed away in 1979.





**NHSACA 6<sup>th</sup> President**

**Pinky Babb, South Carolina**

**Convention: Atlanta, GA 1971**

JULIUS WISTAR "PINKY" BABB JR. (1916-1983)

Pinky Babb was born December 6, 1916 in Princeton, South Carolina. He played college football at Furman University and was all state in 1936. He coached at Greenwood HS for 39 years and won 9 state championships. He won 346 games in his career. Pinky also coached baseball and won a state championship in 1966. He helped found the NHSACA and served as President in 1970-71. He was the NHSACA Football Coach of the Year in 1975. He was inducted into the State Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1973 and the National in 1976. He was the 1981 Dwight Keith Award recipient. He was married to Elizabeth and they had a daughter and a son. He retired in 1982 and was in declining health before his death, November 26, 1983.



**NHSACA 7<sup>th</sup> President**

**Tom McVay, Oklahoma**

**Convention: Pueblo, CO 1972**

TOM McVAY (1920-2005)

Tom McVay was born December 7, 1920 in Wildsville, Louisiana. He graduated from Stuttgart HS as a four-sport letterman and All State Football player in 1939. He had a scholarship to the University of Arkansas but served in the military instead. He married Helen Boals in 1941. He enrolled in Southeastern Oklahoma State in Durant, OK in 1947 and was a three-sport letterman. He played semi-pro baseball. He started coaching at Antlers HS in 1949. He spent 2 years at Antlers, 6 years at Maysville (2 State Championships), and 1 year at Wetumka. He then moved to Beaver HS where he spent 15 years and won 3 State Football Championships. The football stadium at Beaver was named for him in 1996. Tom then went to Durant HS for 3 years and finished his career at Dickson HS in 1979. He joined the Oklahoma Coaches Association in 1951 and served as President 1967-68. He was President of the NHSACA 1971-72 and inducted into their Hall of Fame in 2001. He and Helen were married 59 years and had 6 children. He passed away March 30, 2005.







**NHSACA 8<sup>th</sup> President**

**Bill Farthing, Wyoming**

**Convention: Jackson Hole, WY 1973**

**BILL FARTHING**

Bill Farthing was born April 8<sup>th</sup>. He started coaching at Morton High School in 1958. He was an assistant coach in three sports. In 1960 he moved to Powell where he taught mathematics and was head track coach until 1976. During that time, he also spent some time as an assistant football coach, assistant basketball coach, and head football in 1974-75. He helped write the Wyoming Coaches Association constitution and started the WCA "Coach of the Year."

He served as Executive Secretary of the Wyoming Coaches Association from 1964-66. In 1966 he was named a Charter Member for the NHSACA. Bill served as President of the NHSACA 1972-73. Bill left the education field in 1976 to help his parents with their real estate business. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1995. He was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 2011. Bill was awarded the Carey E. McDonald Citation in 2015.



**NHSACA 9<sup>th</sup> President**

**Tom Monahan, Connecticut**

**Convention: New Haven, CT 1974**

**THOMAS R. MONAHAN (1918-2003)**

Thomas Monahan was born June 12, 1918 in Bristol, Connecticut. He went to Scarborough Prep in New York and played three sports there and then attended Columbia University where he played quarterback and halfback on the football team. Tom was drafted into the US Army Air Corps in September, 1941. When the war ended, he returned to Columbia and graduated. He got his master's degree from Columbia Teachers' College. He married Rose Fegan of Washington. They had 5 daughters. He returned to Bristol HS in 1948 to teach biology and coach basketball, baseball, and follow his father as AD in Bristol. Tom served as President of the NHSACA 1973-74. He received the first Dwight Keith Award in 1978. He retired in 1979. He received the Connecticut Sports Writers' Alliance Gold Key Award in 1984. Tom was a Charter Member for both the Connecticut and National Coaches Associations. He was inducted in the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1997. He passed away July 2, 2003.





**NHSACA 10<sup>th</sup> President**  
**Jimmy Bryan, Virginia**  
**Convention: Orlando, FL 1975**

JAMES BENTON "JIMMIE" BRYAN (1916-2005)

Jimmie Bryan was born April 4, 1916, in Staunton, Virginia. He graduated from Ohio University in 1941 and received a Master's in Administration in 1968. He also was given an honorary Doctorate in Humane Letters in 1986 from Lynchburg College. Jimmie and Neva were married for 65 years. They had a son and a daughter. Jimmie coached basketball at E.C. Glass High School for 27 years with a record of 478-94. He had four state championships and four 2<sup>nd</sup>

place finishes. Jimmie served as President of the NHSACA 1974-75. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1979. He was inducted in the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1996. He is known for saying "It is great to be alive in \_\_\_\_\_", wherever he happened to be. He served 3 terms as mayor and had the unofficial title of "Mr. Lynchburg". Jimmie passed away August 6, 2005.



**NHSACA 11<sup>th</sup> President**  
**Lloyd Gaskill, Colorado**  
**Convention: Portland, OR 1976**

LLOYD GASKILL (1912-1997)

Lloyd Gaskill was born June 8, 1912 in Flagler, Colorado. He graduated from Hugo High School in 1931 and from Colorado State Teachers College with a teaching degree in 1935. He began teaching and coaching in Limon and married his high school sweetheart Ethel Sherman. Lloyd taught business and coached football, basketball, and track till 1939. He and his wife operated Gaskill's Department Store in Holly and he went back and forth between the store and teaching several times. In 1959 he returned to teach and coach at Limon HS and stayed until he retired in 1977. Coach Gaskill had 8 unbeaten seasons and reached the state playoffs in 20 of his 29 years. Lloyd served as President of the NHSACA 1975-76. He was National Football Coach of the Year in 1981. Lloyd received the Dwight Keith Award in 1983. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame for the NHSACA in 1996. Lloyd passed away February 9, 1997.





### **NHSACA 12<sup>th</sup> President**

**Paul Briggs, California**

**Convention: Hampton, VA 1977**

**PAUL LEONARD BRIGGS (1920-2011)**

Paul Briggs was born in Providence, Rhode Island April 18, 1920, and grew up in Grand Junction, Colorado. He lettered in wrestling and football and was chosen for the All-Star Football Team, graduating from Grand Junction HS in 1939. He attended Mesa Junior College and then played football for three years at the University of Colorado. Paul joined the Navy in 1943 and was stationed on the destroyer USS Daly. He earned a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart. Paul married Sally in May of 1946. They were married 63 years and had one daughter. Paul played for the Detroit Lions in 1948, but suffered a career-ending knee injury. Paul started coaching at Rocky Ford High School in Colorado in 1949. He was the head football coach at Bakersfield High School from 1953-85 with a record of 210-99-15. Paul was elected President of the California Coaches Association in 1964. Paul served as President of the NHSACA 1976-77. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1980. He left high school coaching and was the assistant at Orange Coast College from 1986 to 2005. Paul passed away February 14, 2011.

**Bob Metcalf, Illinois**

**Convention: Tulsa, OK 1978**

**ROBERT LEO METCALF (1926-2020)**

Robert Leo Metcalf was born in Elwood, Indiana, April 30, 1926. He attended Merrillville High School and entered the US Navy in 1944. Two years later he went to Valparaiso University where he set the scoring record in basketball. He married his high school sweetheart, Marjorie Reed, in 1947. They were married 70 years and had four daughters. Robert started his teaching career at Waterman HS. He was also at Glenbard West before going to University HS in Normal, IL in 1961. He received his doctorate from Indiana University in 1968. He retired in 1982. Robert was the Executive Director of the Illinois Coaches Association from 1974-82. He served as NHSACA President 1977-78. He was also awarded the Dwight Keith Award I 1999 and the Carey McDonald Citation in 1999. He is a member of the Illinois Golf and Basketball Halls of Fame as well as the NHSAA Hall of Fame. He made his first trip to China in 1980 as a basketball expert and made more than 10 trips to teach and coach basketball. Robert passed away April 16, 2020.

**Bob Mosher, Florida**

**Convention: Orlando, FL 1979**

ROBERT MOSER (1922-1999)

Robert (Bob) Moser was born in 1922. He coached at Winter Park High School for 33 years in track and field. He also coached football 16 years and was the AD for 18 years. He was named Track Coach of the Year in Florida 11 times. He served as President of the NHSACA 1978-79. He was the National Track Coach of the Year in 1982 and Athletic Director of the Year in 1985. He was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame and in 1989 won the Dwight Keith Award. Bob passed away February 13, 1999.



**NHSACA 15<sup>th</sup> President**

**Max Hawk, South Dakota**

**Convention: Seattle, WA 1980**

MAX HAWK (1933-2021)

Max Hawk was born March 19, 1933 in Wessington Springs, SD. He graduated from HS in 1951 and attended Northern State University, Aberdeen. He took out time to serve in the US Army during the Korean War and returned to the University to get his bachelor's and master's degrees. He married Jane Sheldon in 1956. He and Jane had 3 children. Max started teaching in Scotland, SD then went to Yankton in 1965 for the next 30 years.

He won 10 state football championships during that time. Max served as the Executive Director of the South Dakota Coaches Association for 40 years. He was NHSACA President 1979-80 and attended 50 consecutive conventions. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1985. He was National Football Coach of the Year in 1986. He was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1996. He also received the Carey E. McDonald Citation in 1997. Max passed away January 22, 2021.

**Larry McHugh, Connecticut**  
**Convention: Biloxi, MS 1981**

**LARRY McHUGH**

Larry McHugh attended Notre Dame High School in West Haven, CN. He graduated from Southern Connecticut State College in 1962. He played football and was a member of the National All-American Academic Team. He played professionally for the New York Titans in 1961. Larry then began his teaching career at Dunham HS. He next coached at Xavier from 1963-83 with a record of 152-36-6. Larry was National Football Coach of the Year in 1973. He served as NHSACA President 1980-81. He was inducted into the CHSCA Hall of Fame in 1984 and in 1985 was given a Gold Key by the Connecticut Sports Writers Association. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1986. He was inducted into the NHSCA Hall of Fame in 1997. He received the Carey E. McDonald Citation in 2018. He also served as the President of the Middlesex Chamber of Commerce for 40 years.

**Joe Tunnell, Oklahoma**  
**Convention: Indianapolis, IN 1982**

**JOSEPH TUNNELL (1937-2021)**

Joe Tunnell was born September 18, 1937 in Chickasha, OK. He graduated from Rush Springs HS in 1955 and East Central University in 1959. He played football in high school and college. He earned his masters from ECU in 1963. He coached at Lindsey and Rush Springs for a total of 41 years with a record of 322-137-7. Joe served as NHSACA President 1981-82. He was the National Football Coach of the Year in 1991. He was inducted in the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1997. He retired from teaching in 2000, but continued serving the Oklahoma Coaches Association as Exhibits/Clinic Coordinator for the next 20 years. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 2016. Joe passed away March 2, 2021.

**Charlie Grisham, Georgia**

**Convention: Albuquerque, NM 1983**

**CHARLES GRISHAM (1931-1999)**

Charlie Grisham was born February 1, 1931. He graduated from Blount County High School and played football at Jacksonville State University. He also received a masters' degree from Auburn University and West Georgia College in Carrollton. He started at Carrollton in 1956 as an assistant coach and became the head football coach and athletic director in 1958. He spent 28 years compiling a record of 261-70-13. He won 5 state titles during that time. He was

married to Yvonne. Charlie was inducted into the Georgia State Athletic Hall of Fame in 1974 and was National High School Football Coach of the Year in 1981. He served as President of the NHSACA 1982-83. He was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1998. Charlie passed away September 3, 1999.

**EDWARD KINTZ**

Edward Kintz was born in 1939. He graduated from Louisville HS in 1957 where he lettered in football, basketball, and track. He graduated from Colorado College in 1962 where he played football and was an All-Conference Quarterback in 1961. He started coaching at St. Mary's HS in Colorado Springs, then he was at Englewood for 3 years. He was at Mullen seven years, Pomona seven years and Bear Creek six years. He worked in arena football

then went back to high school at Golden for a few years. He made 9 play-off appearances during his career. Ed served as President of the NHSACA 1983-84. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1988. He was the Teacher/Coach of the year in Colorado in 1994. He served 13 years as the Colorado High School Coaches' Association Executive Secretary. He was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 2008.

**GARY HOWARD BRINES (1936-2013)**

Gary Brines was born in Centralia, WA, July 7, 1936. He attended Washington State University for one year, then graduated from the University of Puget Sound in 1958 where he lettered in football and baseball. He married Miss Spencer and they had four children. He taught at Centralia and Toppenish HS before moving to Federal Way in 1965. He coached basketball and tennis and then became the athletic director, retiring in 1984. He served as President of the NHSACA 1986-86. He served as Executive Director of the NHSACA. Gary passed away June 30, 2013.

**ROBERT GORDON WOOD (1941-2019)**

Bob Wood was born May 23, 1941. He graduated from Grosse Pointe University School in 1959 and earned a teaching degree from Elizabethtown College. He began his career at Harrisburg Academy in Pennsylvania. He then returned to his alma mater and spent 38 years at University Liggett School. His boys' and girls' teams won 39 state championships. Bob was the first tennis coach to be inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations Hall of Fame. He was the NHSACA Tennis Coach of the Year in 1981. He served as President of the NHSACA in 1986-87. He received the Dwight Keith Award in 1993. Bob was inducted into the NHSACA Hall of Fame in 1997. The tennis center at University Liggett School was named for Bob in 2002. Bob also directed the Country Club of Detroit Day Clamp from 1969 to 2013. Bob married Sharon and they had four children. He is survived by his wife, Kathy. Bob Wood passed away February 16, 2019.

**GELAINE ORVIK**

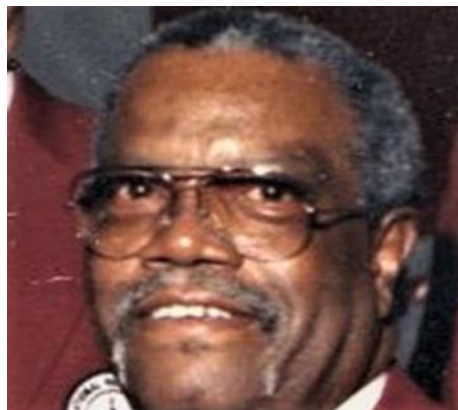
